

COMMANDS OF CHRIST

“When people believe, we MUST know how to disciple and train them in the basics.”

Command #1 – Repent & Believe

Care: Share a highlight and a challenge from your week.

Worship: Pray for one another and thank God for His love and faithfulness OR take communion together OR you may even want to sing a song to the Lord (if appropriate for the setting)!

Accountability: How have you obeyed Jesus since our last session? How have you shared your story or Jesus' story since our last session? How are your friends doing at obeying Jesus, including the Great Commission?

Vision: Why should we get out of our comfort zones to care about others' souls?

Command: In Mark 1:15, Jesus says...

Tell the Story: Zacchaeus' Salvation from Luke 19:1-10

What does repent mean?

Turning from sin and following Jesus.

What does believe mean?

Believe means choosing to trust Jesus as Lord.

Why should we repent?

Romans 3:23, Rom. 6:23, Rom. 10:9-10

Who should repent?

Acts 2:38-41- Everyone must repent for forgiveness.

What is assurance?

1 John 1:7-9 - As we walk in the light, we will be cleansed. And when His light exposes sin, we confess it. As we confess our sin, Jesus forgives us and cleanses us.

John 10:28 - Our salvation belongs to Jesus.

Practice: Retell the story of Zacchaeus from Luke 19.

Set goals: Be SMART (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, Timely)

- Have you confessed your sins before the Lord? If you have, share with someone how that happened.
- Who will you share your story and Jesus' story with this week?
- What is your plan to meet with your friends and help them obey Jesus (including the Great Commission)? Who needs to know they can receive Christ's Spirit?

Pray: Ask our Heavenly Father for the faith and power to obey Him this week. Pray for the people in your life who are far from God – specifically, that they will choose to follow Jesus. Pray for your friends and their future disciples.

What **Scripture** verse or question pops out?

What **promises** are in the passage?

What **attributes** of God are discovered?

What **commands** are given?

What **examples** are seen from the people in the passage – good, bad and ugly?

Command #2 – Identify with Christ

Care: Share a highlight and a challenge from your week.

Worship: Pray for one another and thank God for His love and faithfulness OR take communion together OR you may even want to sing a song to the Lord (if appropriate for the setting)!

Accountability: How have you obeyed Jesus since our last session? How have you shared your story or Jesus' story since our last session? How are your friends doing at obeying Jesus, including the Great Commission?

Vision: Why should we get out of our comfort zones to care about others' souls?

Key questions: We will explore the answers to these questions in this and the next study.

- How would you answer this question, "Who are you?"
- What would you say currently defines you: your past, your pain, the world system, our feelings or God & His Word?

Our identity directs what we do. If we are confused about who we are, we will be confused as to what we do and what we pursue.

In Matthew 3:13-17, Jesus, the Righteous One, allowed who he was to direct what he did. What do you notice from this story about the nature of God? What do you notice about Jesus and his baptism? Why was He baptized? How was He baptized?

Read Ephesians 2:1-3. Write down what you discover about God and who someone is **without** Jesus Christ.

Now read Ephesians 2:4-10 and write down what you discover about God and who someone is **with** Jesus Christ?

In light of these passages, who would you say you are now?

*When we accept Christ, we are to be baptized, not to be forgiven but because we **are** forgiven. Just as a wedding ring represents the inward reality that someone now identifies with their spouse, baptism represents an inward reality that we now identify with Jesus Christ. **Next time, we'll take a look at what the Bible has to say about baptism.***

Practice: Retell the story of Ephesians 2.

Set goals: Be SMART (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, Timely)

- Look at 1 Peter 2:9 & 2 Corinthians 5:17-21. What do these passages say about who you are in Christ?
- Who will you share your story and Jesus' story with this week?
- What is your plan to meet with your friends and help them obey Jesus (including the Great Commission)? Who needs to know they can receive Christ's Spirit?

Pray: Ask our Heavenly Father for the faith and power to obey Him this week. Pray for the people in your life who are far from God – specifically, that they will choose to follow Jesus. Pray for your friends and their future disciples.

Command #3 – Be Baptized

Care: Share a highlight and a challenge from your week.

Worship: Pray for one another and thank God for His love and faithfulness OR take communion together OR you may even want to sing a song to the Lord (if appropriate for the setting)!

Accountability: How have you obeyed Jesus since our last session? How have you shared your story or Jesus' story since our last session? How are your friends doing at obeying Jesus, including the Great Commission?

Vision: Why should we get out of our comfort zones to care about others' souls?

Key question: If someone you loved repeatedly asked you to do something, then disappeared, how attentive would you be to fulfilling their desire?

After His resurrection, Matthew 28:18-20 sums up Jesus' desire and our purpose. "Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, **baptizing** them in the name of the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey all that I commanded you and lo, I am with you, even to the end of the age."

Read Romans 6:4-5. What does this tell us that baptism represents?

Read Acts 2:38-39

- What are we to do if we are to receive the Spirit of Christ?
- How does this affect other people in our life?

What if someone was baptized before receiving Christ?

In Acts 19:1-5, what do you notice? Though the people had been baptized, they were baptized to identify with John, not Jesus. Now they had the chance to be baptized to identify with Jesus. They got baptized again but for a different reason, because they accepted forgiveness through Jesus.

Practice: Tell your story of how you became a new creature in Christ.

Set goals: Be SMART (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, Timely)

- If you have not been baptized since accepting forgiveness through Jesus, or if you were baptized before accepting Jesus as Lord and Savior, ask someone who has been baptized to baptize you, as Jesus was, to demonstrate that you accept God's forgiveness and want to identify with Jesus.
- Who will you share your story and Jesus' story with this week?
- What is your plan to meet with your friends and help them obey Jesus (including the Great Commission)? Who needs to know they can receive Christ's Spirit?

Pray: Ask our Heavenly Father for the faith and power to obey Him this week. Pray for the people in your life who are far from God, that they will choose to follow Jesus. Pray for your friends and their future disciples.

“Give us today our daily bread”

-pray for needs

“Forgive us our debts”

-pray for forgiveness

“Deliver us from the evil one”

-pray for resistance of temptation

Command #5 – Receive His Spirit & His Word

Care: Share a highlight and a challenge from your week.

Command: In Luke 24:46-49 and Acts 1:5-8, Jesus says...

Tell the Story: Bezalel was not a priest, prophet or pastor. He was a craftsman.

Exodus 31:1-6

Though all true Christians have the Holy Spirit (Ephesians 1:13), not all are empowered, led or filled with the Holy Spirit. If not filled with the Holy Spirit, what would you say fills people?

The bottom line is, what we are filled with will affect not only our work but our whole life. So, how do we get filled with the Spirit?

Compare and contrast Eph. 5:18-21 and Col. 3:15-17. (The commands are different, but the effects are similar.)

To be filled with the Spirit, what do you see that someone should do?

Read Galatians 5:16-26. What will result from our choosing to be consistently filled with the Spirit?

What do these verses say we need to do to experience the Holy Spirit given to you through Christ: Acts 2:38-39; Acts 5:32; Luke 11:9-13

Practice: Retell the story of Bezalel and explain why being filled with the Spirit is important.

Set goals: Be SMART (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, Timely)

Our money, time, and our lives.

There are three types of giving – the tithe, freewill offering and alms (giving to the poor). The tithe is 10% of your income.

What is the purpose of the tithe, according to Deut. 14:22-23?

Malachi 3:8-12 gives us a promise when we tithe. But in Matthew 23:23, Jesus says we should do more than tithe.

Why should we give to God?
2 Corinthians 9:6-7 – Give generously and we will receive generously. God loves a cheerful giver.

How do we give to God?
2 Corinthians 9:7 – Cheerfully, not under compulsion.
Matthew 6:1-4 – Secretly, not for recognition.

Who do we give to?
2 Corinthians 9 – A collection was given to a church.
Acts 4:34-35 – The church gave to all who had need.





REMEMBER: A church that is simple is easier to reproduce...

PRAYER WALKING

Prayer walking is simply praying as one walks through a community, village, town or city. It is praying with all of one's senses – sight, sound, smell, touch, etc. As one walks the streets, one asks for:

OPEN HEAVENS: Pray blessings on the community, not curses! *Isaiah 64:1 "Oh that you would rend the heavens and come down, that the mountains would tremble before you!"*

OPEN HEARTS: Pray the Holy Spirit opens the hearts of the people in the community to the gospel of Jesus Christ! *Acts 2:17,21 "In the last days, God says, 'I will pour out my Spirit on all people' ... and everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."*

OPEN HOMES: Pray for supernatural encounters, resulting in discovery Bible studies in houses of peace! *Acts 2:46-47 "They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."*

OPEN HIGHWAYS: Pray to the God of the harvest that He would cause multiplication in disciple-making groups! (C4) *Isaiah 40:3-5 "In the desert prepare the way for the Lord, make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God. Every valley shall be raised up and every mountain and hill made low, the ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. And the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all mankind shall see it."*

OPEN HANDS: Pray with open hands to be moved by God's compassion to be Love Load in your community! *Matthew 10:7-8 "As you go, preach this message: 'The kingdom of heaven is near.' Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons. Freely you have received, freely give."*

We pray against strongholds in the community! We never pray against people but against the strongholds Satan has set up in our community! *2 Corinthians 10:3-6 "For though we live in the world, we do not wage war as the world does. The weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary, they have divine power to demolish strongholds. We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ. And we will be ready to punish every act of disobedience, once your obedience is complete."*

Places of Government: Pray for the men and women in government, but pray against various ways a government may oppress people. Pray for truth, justice in our communities.

Places of Education: It has been said, "Whoever holds the hearts and minds of the children and youth holds the hearts of the nation." Often, educational institutions are places where children and youth are taught things that are in opposition to God's truth – such as atheism, communism, false religions. We need to pray over these educational institutions, asking God to redeem these places and redeem the hearts of those who teach the children and youth.

Places of Commerce: It is known that most social injustice is the result of the rich, who oppress the poor. Businesses and other places of commerce are often powerful strongholds that keep people from seeing the true light of the gospel of Jesus Christ. We need to pray that God would redeem society so that social justice will prevail. We need to pray that the poor would no longer be oppressed by the rich.

Places of Religion/Culture: The worship of false, counterfeit gods keeps the people from seeing the truth that Jesus is the way, the truth and the life. We need to pray that people would have their eyes and their hearts open to see that no one can come to salvation except through Jesus Christ. We need to pray that idolatry, which is abominable to God, would be demolished and destroyed so that people would return to the worship of the One, True and Living God.

Some instructions about how to do Prayer Walking two-by-two, as per Luke 10 (Personal spiritual preparation):

- *Repentance and confession of sins*
- *Spiritual purification and preparedness, clean hands and a pure heart (James 4:8)*
- *Spending time to study the Bible; memorizing Scripture and choruses/hymns*
- *Prayer for the opening of spiritual eyes, perception, discernment, seeing and hearing in the Spirit of intercession and a heart of compassion*
- *Overcome personal fear by intercession and putting on the armor of God (Eph. 6:10-20)*
- *Recruit personal intercessors for you while you are out praying*
